Porcupine is a Society to promote interest in the ecology and distribution of marine fauna and flora in the N.E. Atlantic. Its name is derived from the surveying vessel "Porcupine" engaged in 1869 and 1870 on scientific expeditions in the N.E. Atlantic and Mediterranean, and which gave its name to the Porcupine Bank west of Ireland.

The chief aims of PORCUPINE are:

- 1. To promote interest in aspects of marine biology involved in the distribution and recording of marine organisms.
- 2. To be a forum for discussion of progress and problems at all levels, especially on a personal basis at meetings.
- 3. To publish a Newsletter soon after each meeting.

It is envisaged that meetings will occur three times a year and be held at various venues in Scotland, Ireland, and the north of England. These will normally last two days and take the form of discussion or field work centred on a particular theme.

The Newsletter will include a report of the meeting and additional articles on a wide range of subjects. A start has been made

In the course of my attendance at the 11th European Symposium on Marine Biology at Galway (Ireland), 5th - 11th October, 1976 I was able to publicise PORCUPINE. There was an informal discussion meeting on the evenings of Bengalay, 9th October at which I spoke, describing the origins of PORCUPINE (a personal appraisal) and its present scope and aims.

For 10 years I have been involved in biological recording of marine and non-marine British mollusca. I have been mostly concerned with the marine side and in 1974 became Marine Recorder for the Conchological Society of Great Britain and Ireland. In that capacity in April 1975 I went to Dundee to BIOREC 75 which was a conference on biological recording in Scotland. Out of about 100 delegates there were only three, Stewart Angus, David W. McKay and myself who were interested in or who had much knowledge of marine matters. This fact spoke for itself.

Since then, recording of marine mollusca, despite a superficial appearance to the contrary, was starting to stagnate through lack of a workable framework of data input and retrieval, lack of support from the Biological Records Centre, Monkswood, or from the council of the Conchological Society. Last but not least there was no agreed grid system as a basis for data mapping. My efforts to improve matters despite an increasing body of opinion behind me got nowhere and ended in my being obliged to resign as Marine Recorder at the beginning of the year.

By this time the seeds of PORCUPINE had been sown and in March 1976 during the symposium on Sea-slugs and Land-slugs held in the Royal Scottish Museum a small group of us now instantly recognisable as the provisional office-bearers of PORCUPINE discussed the basic ideas, most of the impetus coming from David McKay and myself. The name was thought up by David Heppell. From the start the necessity for PORCUPINE to be widely based covering all phyla, particularly those for which there were recording schemes, was paramount.

I went on to outline the aims of PORCUPINE as set out elsewhere in this Newsletter. In the discussion which followed there was much sympathy for my problems with BRC, although the lack of commitment by BRC to marine recording is well understood. There was enthusiasm for the setting up of a unified grid system based on the ICES (Lat. Long.) and for a unified method of proceeing data so that information should be easy to enter and interchange. It was admitted that there are several bodies already in existence who shoul be able to cover the work required but they were becoming conspicuous by their lack of published or publicised effort. Discussion might have continued all evening but was brought to a close as there were other items upon which people wished to speak. Fifty people added their names to a list of those who wished to hear more about PORCUPINE.

A DAY'S SHELLING ON A SEINE NET FISHING BOAT

On the morning of 27th April, 1976, the time is 0300 hrs. the seine net vessel Gleaners II WK164 slips her mooring ropes and glides quietly out of Scrabster Harbour. The only audible noise is the steady rythmic throb of her 114 H.P. Gardner diesel engine. She is heading for a day's fishing on local grounds.

The crew of the Gleaners II consists of four. The Skipper is Jim Bremmer from Keiss, a native of this village; the Leading Hand is Rab Robertson, a Stroma man now living in Keiss; Charlie Farquhar is the Sorter and hails from the fair Town of Buckie; while last but not least the Cook, Johnnie Henderson, a Wicker, all together a stalwart team of Northern sea fishers.

The Gleaners is steaming for the Stormy Bank some 20 miles N.W. by Holborn Head. This fishing bank is aptly named - it is the meeting place of tides from the east, north and west, which converge during Winter and Spring to form a swelling, squalling maelstrom. Rich in most types of demersal fish and renowned throughout the North of Scotland for its haddock.

After some $2\frac{1}{2}$ - 3 hours steaming the Gleaners has arrived on mark and is ready to shoot her net. This is done by dropping her marker buoy and steaming for about 1 mile in the direction the tide favours, then turning in arc and dropping her 46 fathom net, completing the arc and steaming back to pick up her marker buoy. The large pear shaped manner in which her net has been shot has now to be towed along the bottom slowly until closed and them swiftly hauled up and landed on board. Once the net is on board and the bag has been emptied into the fish pond, a conchologist can come into his own, seaweeds, stones, sponges, polyps etc., provide molluscan homes larger species can be found lying around, and when once again the net has been shot, the aft deck on which it has been lying is a very good shelling spot.

On average, a seine met boat on the Stormy Bank will shoot nets 5 - 6 times in a 16 hour day if all goes well, and providing a conchologist makes himself useful in helping the crew between shots, he will be welcome to search round during the favourable periods and even be assisted in his quest.

There follows a list of Molluscs obtained on 27th April, 1976 by the Gleaners II. Latitudes and Longtitudes are not quoted as a Skipper's "Mark" is valuable commercial information.

I wish to thank the crew of the Gleaners II for their undying enthusiasm in assisting me with my shell collecting and also Dr. Shelagh Smith for her determinations and assistance with the Marine Mollusca of Northern Scottish Waters.
